## LOCAL CONNECTION



Did you know that approximately 10% of people who enter jail or prison are homeless, and many of them lack the resources to rejoin society, once they get out? This has led to an increase of individuals being incarcerated within three years of being released.

United Way collaborated with the Gwinnett County Sheriff's Department on GRIP (Gwinnett Re-entry Intervention Program) to help combat this growing problem. GRIP helps inmates be more successful at reentering society and provides transitional housing as well as mental and primary health services, employment services, financial literacy courses and applications for benefits.

In the past three years, GRIP has helped more than 250 people trying to reenter society. It has also reduced the rate of people returning to the Gwinnett County Detention Center by more than 50%.

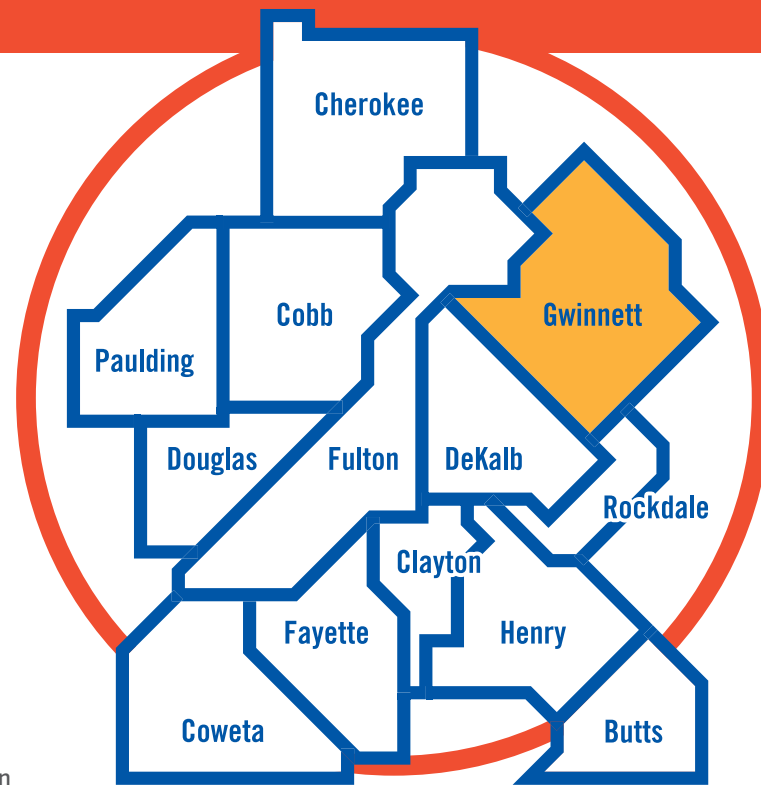

## COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHTS

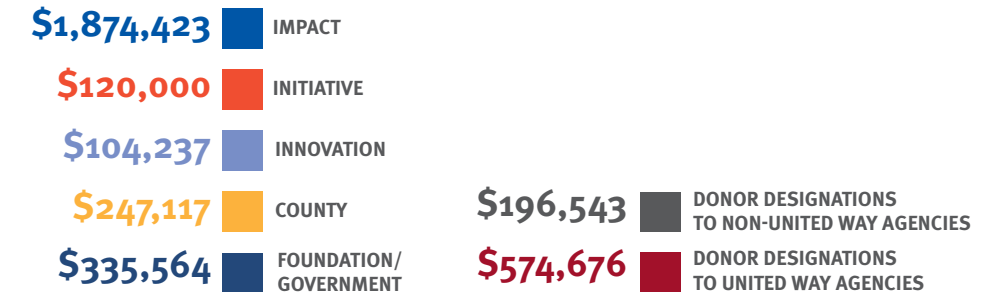
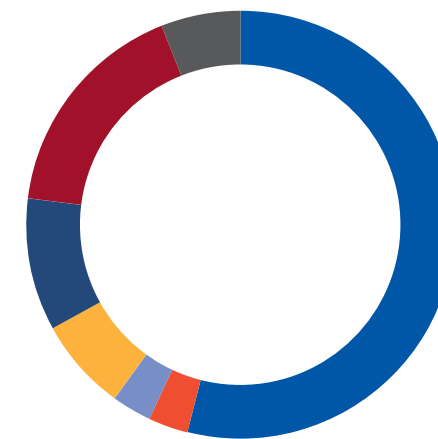
- Last year, United Way and its partners helped 48,827 individuals from Gwinnett County.
- 20,580 children showed academic improvement.
- 1,646 individuals received support to resolve a crisis and have their basic needs met.
- 4,414 individuals received emergency financial assistance that enabled them to avoid homelessness and remain in safe and stable housing.
- 4,004 individuals now have a medical home (a routine place to receive preventative health care).
- During the summer of 2015, United Way's Silence the Growl campaign which supports summer feeding programs for children provided 1,370 meals for children in Gwinnett County.

### TOTAL FUNDS INVESTED FOR FISCAL YEAR 2014-2015



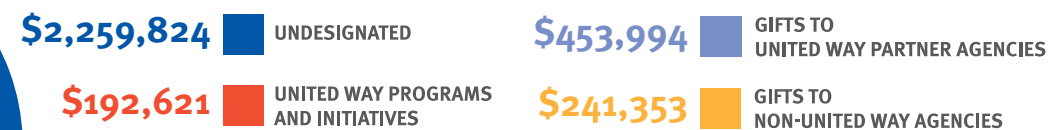
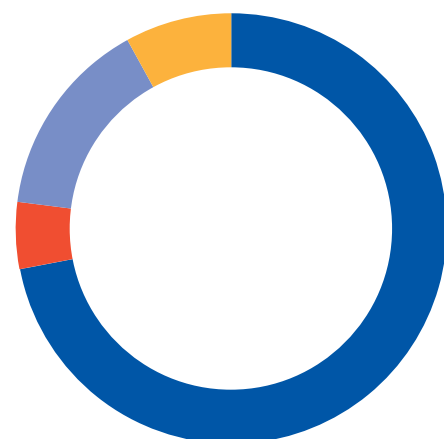

## 2-1-1 GWINNETT COUNTY

Information obtained from our 2-1-1 Contact Center is critical to maintaining a connection to the needs of each community United Way serves. 2-1-1 connects people 24/7 to the resources they need to address the everyday challenges of living, as well as those that develop during times of emergencies. Last year 2-1-1 received 12,021 contacts from Gwinnett County and the top 5 needs were **rent payment assistance (2,404)**, **electrical service payment assistance (2,024)**, **food pantries (1,728)**, **transitional housing shelters(1,389)** and **community shelters (1,381)**.
